Jackpot	Numerous players swimming pool skins into a single pot. The higher the skin value contributed, the greater the mathematical opportunity of winning the whole swimming pool.	High

- **Be careful of "Too Good to Be True" Offers:** If a random user adds you on Steam declaring you won a giveaway on a random CS2 casino, it is guaranteed to be a phishing scam designed to take your inventory.
- **Understand the House Edge:** Just like a standard brick-and-mortar casino, the mathematics is constantly programmed in favor of the platform. In the long run, the home always wins.
