7 Tips for Winning CS: GO Case Battles

1. Pick Battles with Lower House Edges

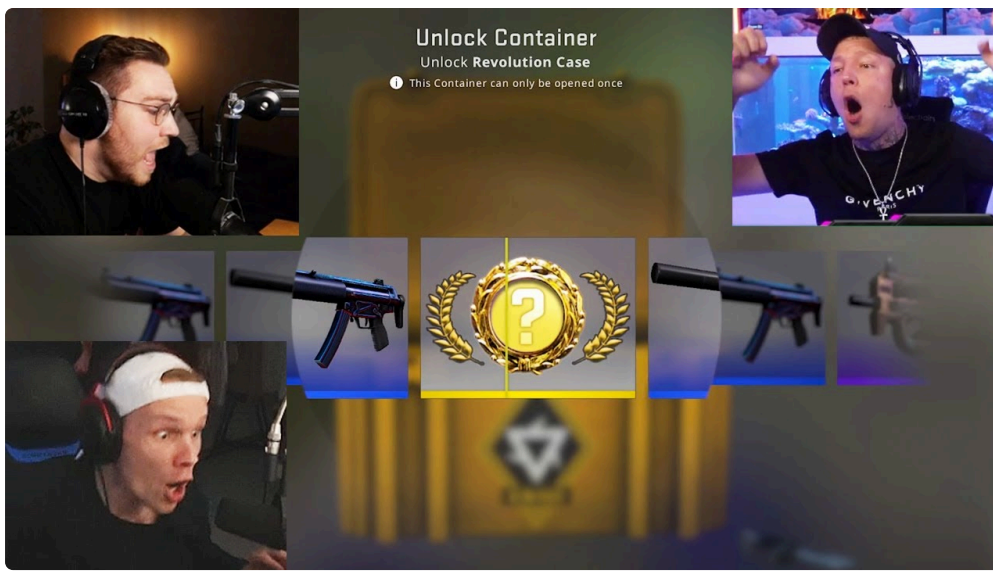
