

Why unwanted pests find their way into Brampton homes

Most pest problems start with tiny **entry points** that are easy to miss during a brief walk-around. In Brampton, that matters because the city has a mix of older suburban homes, newer developments, townhouses, and shared-wall properties, and each type can hide different gaps. Older houses often have settling **foundation cracks** and worn trim, while newer builds can still leave openings around utility lines, rooflines, and unfinished areas that need better **weatherproofing**.

Which entry points should you review first?

- **Foundation cracks** where concrete has settled or chipped
- **Door sweeps** with visible light under the **door threshold**

Walk around the full perimeter in daylight, then check again after dark with a flashlight from the inside. If you can see light, air movement, or daylight through a gap, pests can likely use it too. Look closely to basement windows, garage corners, and any place where the exterior cladding meets the foundation.

In Brampton, attached garages and basement walkouts are common weak points. Garage weather seals wear down quickly, and pests can enter through the bottom edge of a door long before you notice a problem. Townhouse owners should also inspect shared-wall edges, utility chases, and service penetrations because one hidden opening can affect several units.

Do not miss roof-level access. If you have attic venting, soffits, or older flashing, pests may move down from the roofline into wall voids. A full inspection should cover the entire structure, not just the basement.

How do you block openings around doors and windows?

Doors, windows, and frames are among the most effective places to improve **prevention**. They flex, grow, and shrink with temperature changes, so the seals wear out over time. Start with the front door, side door, garage-to-

house door, and basement entries. Replace damaged **weatherstripping** so the door closes tightly against the frame, and inspect the **door threshold** for gaps that let in air or cold.

If you can feel air around the frame, **caulking** may be needed along the trim and siding joints. Use a quality exterior **caulk** for small cracks around **window frames**, then smooth it so water cannot collect. Around older windows, check both the inside and outside edges, because pests often use hidden seams in the trim or sill.

Window screens should also be checked for tears, loose corners, or bent frames. A damaged screen is not just a bug issue; it can also invite spiders and other insects that follow prey indoors. Make sure windows close fully and latch without leaving a gap.

If you are sealing an older Brampton home, expect more shrinkage and movement around wood trim and masonry joints. In newer developments, the challenge is often less about age and more about installation gaps that were never fully sealed. Either way, weatherproofing around openings is one of the fastest ways to reduce pest access.

For recurring problems, combine new seals with regular upkeep. Even the best **weatherstripping** will fail eventually if the door is warped or the threshold is loose.

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What substances work best for bigger holes and rodent access?

When holes are wider than a minor crack, you need materials that block chewing and movement, not just air. For rodent-prone openings, **steel wool** is commonly used as a packing material for temporary blocking, but it is most effective when paired with a sealant or another covering that holds it in place. Rodents hate gnawing through rough metal fibers, which makes it useful for irregular gaps.

Hardware cloth is one of the strongest materials for larger openings because it creates a sturdy **mesh screen** barrier. Use it over vents, crawlspace openings, and gaps near the foundation where mice or small animals may try to enter. Choose a mesh size that blocks the pest you are targeting, and fasten it securely so it cannot be pushed aside.

Expanding foam can help fill voids, but it should not be your only defence for rodent access. Foam is useful for insulation and shaping around pipes or uneven openings, yet pests can chew through it if it is exposed. For a better result, use foam only after reinforcing the gap with hardware cloth, metal flashing, or another chew-resistant barrier.

For difficult spaces, think in layers: fill the void, block the opening, then seal the edges. That layered approach is better pest-proofing than relying on one material alone. In homes with older masonry, foundation holes may also need mortar repair or a professional assessment if the damage is structural.

Rule of thumb: steel wool and expanding foam can help with small to medium gaps, but hardware cloth is the stronger choice where chewing pressure is likely.

How can you protect vents, soffits, and roofline openings?

Elevated openings are often overlooked, yet they can be key pathways into the attic and wall cavities. Check all **vents** around the home, including gable vents, foundation vents, dryer vents, and bathroom exhaust exits. Many of these should have a sturdy **mesh screen** or purpose-made **vent covers** that let air pass while blocking pests.

Soffits deserve special attention because they often connect to the attic. If panels are unsecured, cracked, or missing, mice and insects can move into the roof space and travel through the home unseen. Check for stains, gaps, or chewed edges where the soffit meets the fascia and siding.

Chimney caps are also important. A missing cap can invite birds, squirrels, raccoons, and insects, while the opening itself can become a route into the house. Make sure the chimney top is protected with a cap that fits properly and is maintained over time.

Brampton homeowners with older rooflines should inspect for lifted flashing, warped fascia boards, and loose siding near the eaves. Newer homes can still have construction gaps at the roofline, especially where attic ventilation was added later. If pests are entering through the attic, the problem often starts at the exterior roof edge rather than the interior ceiling.

Because so many pests use overhead routes, sealing vents and soffits is just as important as fixing basement gaps. If you skip the top of the house, you may leave a hidden highway into the attic.

How do you secure plumbing, wiring, and utility entry points?

Such openings are among the most typical and most overlooked **entry points**. Any spot where pipes, wires, cables, or ducts pass through the wall can become a gap over time. Check all **pipe penetrations** under sinks, in utility rooms, around water heaters, and at the exterior walls of the basement or garage.

The same goes for **cable entry points** and service lines. Even if the hole looks small, it may widen over time as the building settles. Use a durable **sealant** around the edges after you have filled the opening with the right backing material. For larger voids, foam may be used internally, but the outer finish should still be weather-resistant and appropriately sealed.

When working around utility lines, avoid blocking anything that needs ventilation or access. Gas lines, electrical components, and dryer vents should never be sealed in a way that creates a hazard. If you are not sure whether a specific opening can be sealed safely, it is better to get a qualified opinion.

Inside the home, look behind appliances, under sinks, and around laundry hookups. Small gaps around service runs can let insects and rodents travel from wall spaces into living areas. Seal each opening carefully and inspect again after a few weeks to make sure the materials have not shrunk or pulled away.

Proper food storage matters just as much. Keep dry goods in sealed containers, store pet food in lidded bins, and avoid leaving fruit, bread, or snacks on the counter overnight. Basements, garages, and mudrooms often become hidden food zones, so check those areas carefully. Outdoor **landscaping** should also be trimmed back from the house. Overgrown shrubs, stacked firewood, compost, and dense mulch can give pests cover close to your foundation. Keep branches away from the roofline, and make sure leaves and debris are not collecting near vents or basement openings.

For ongoing **defense**, revisit your seals after major weather changes. Freeze-thaw cycles can reopen caulk lines, loosen thresholds, and crack older mortar. A seasonal check in spring and another in fall is a smart habit for Brampton homeowners.
