

Nepean is among the most rewarding places in Ottawa for people who want access to green space, walking paths, and simple outdoor recreation without leaving the city. Now part of the **City of Ottawa**, Nepean sits west and southwest of downtown Ottawa and features a mix of neighbourhood parks, wooded corridors, and trail systems that connect naturally to the broader landscape.
