(Note: The chances of getting a StatTrak™ variant of any product are approximately 1 in 10 for each drop category).

As the table clearly reveals, the possibility of unboxing a "Gold" (knife or gloves) is simply over **one-quarter of one percent**.

The Economics of Unboxing: Expectation vs. Reality

From an economic standpoint, opening CS: GO cases is, usually, a losing proposal.
