If the frame is structurally sound, the hardware functions (or can be replaced), and the glass is intact, repairs are typically adequate. If you notice extensive wood rot, warping, persistent drafts through the frame itself, or failing window seals throughout several units, replacement is the more affordable long-term solution.
