

Bangkok traffic is not just “busy.” It’s directional, rhythmic, and sometimes oddly predictable. One day you can glide along a ring of expressways and feel like you’re winning the city. The next day, the same trip turns into a slow crawl because a rain squall arrived early, a temple event spilled pedestrians into the roadway, or an accident backed up an entire corridor. In practice, the roadway might have three “soft stops” rather than one hard stop: a cluster of vehicles slowing near a bus stop, a line of delivery trucks, and then a late green signal that bunches traffic. None of that makes the map look dramatic, but it adds up to a creeping delay.

They also know the value of avoiding last-minute lane changes near merges.
