How CSGO Gambling Sites Operate: The Technical Side

Unlike conventional online casinos that utilize fiat currency (GBP, EUR) or cryptocurrencies, CSGO gambling sites rely heavily on **API integration with Steam**.

When a user wishes to deposit or withdraw funds, the process generally follows these steps:

1. **Authentication:** The user logs in through OpenID through their official Steam account.
2. **Stock Sync:** The site's bot reads the user's Steam stock to show their available CSGO skins.
