Rarity Tier Item Classification Approximate Drop Probability **Blue** Mil-Spec Grade ~ 79.92% **Purple** Restricted ~ 15.98% **Pink** Classified ~ 3.20% **Red** Covert ~ 0.64% **Gold/ Special** Knives/ Gloves ~ 0.26%

(Note: Within each tier, there is an additional chance that the item will drop in "StatTrak" condition, a special feature that tracks the number of kills made with that particular weapon.)

As the table plainly demonstrates, the odds of pulling a high-tier item (Red or Gold) are exceptionally low. Statistically, the vast bulk of case openings will result in a Blue-tier product worth significantly less than the £ 2.50 expense of the secret.

The Economics of the Case Marketplace

The value of a CS: GO case and its contents is totally determined by supply and need. Unlike traditional microtransactions where products have a repaired rate, the Steam Community Market works similar to a genuine stock exchange.
