- **Step 1: Remove Old Weatherstripping**Peel away the old rubber, vinyl, or felt weatherstripping from the door frame or the edge of the door. Use a putty knife to scrape away any remaining adhesive residue.
- **Action 2: Clean the Surface**Wipe down the application area with rubbing alcohol to ensure a clean, dust-free surface for the brand-new adhesive.
- **Step 3: Install the New Material**Step the perimeter of the door frame and cut the new weatherstripping to size. Press firmly into place, ensuring a tight seal when the door is closed without making it excessively challenging to lock.
