Case Opening	Simulates the in-game case opening experience, however frequently on third-party sites with custom-curated chances and higher-tier benefit pools. Exceptionally variable; normally favors the house greatly.	
Coinflip	A simple 1v1 PvP video game where 2 gamers wager skins of roughly equal worth. A virtual coin is flipped, and the winner takes the entire pot. 50/50 odds, minus a little platform commission (rake).	
Prize	Multiple gamers contribute skins to a main pot. Each skin's value identifies the gamer's "ticket" share. A spinner picks one winner who takes whatever. Based upon the total value contributed; platform takes a percentage charge.
