- **Never click random links:** Scammers frequently use sponsored search engine result or impersonate expert esports players to promote deceptive phishing websites.

- **Set stringent monetary limits:** Treat gambling simply as a form of home entertainment with a predetermined budget plan, instead of a reputable way to generate income.
- **Protect your Steam account:** Enable Steam Guard Two-Factor Authentication (2FA) and never ever log into your Steam account on unverified third-party domains.
