4. **Confirm Through Independent Channels:** Call support lines or visit FAQs provided on official pages to cross-check verification requests.
5. **Keep Records:** Save screenshots or confirmation messages when you submit your documents securely.
6. **Stay Updated on Phishing Scams:** Follow official brand pages for alerts about common scams and frauds.
