



How to Determine It's a Cockroach Problem

If you believe a cockroach infestation at your Scarborough, ON apartment, the first step is confirming what you are actually seeing. Cockroaches are night-active and often hide during the day, so many renters only notice indirect signs before they see a live insect. In a multi-unit building, that matters because early identification can help improve pest control and lower the chance of spread.

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Check for **cockroach droppings**, which can appear as black pepper, coffee grounds, or tiny dark pellets depending on the species and the size of the infestation.
