As the table reveals, players have less than a 1% chance of striking a Covert skin or a sought after "Exceedingly Rare" knife or set of gloves.

Anatomy of a Weapon Skin

Beyond rarity, items pulled from cases possess additional variables that determine their worth. These variables are produced arbitrarily upon opening:

- **Wear Condition (Float Value):** Skins are categorized into five wear tiers based upon a numerical float value varying from 0.00 to 1.00:
 - Factory New (FN)

- Minimal Wear (MW)
 - Field-Tested (FT)
 - Well-Worn (WW)
 - Battle-Scarred (BS)
- **StatTrak™ Technology:** Roughly 10% of opened items feature a StatTrak™ module, which physically engraves the variety of validated kills made with that weapon onto the surface area. StatTrak items generally command a higher rate.
 - **Pattern Templates:** Certain skins (like the well-known *Case Hardened* AK-47) function randomized textures based upon a pattern index (1 to 1000). Particular unusual patterns-- such as a 100% blue top-- can increase a weapon's worth significantly.

Types of Cases: Prime, Rare, and Commemorative

Over a decade of updates, Valve has released lots of cases. They normally fall into 3 distinct classifications:

1. **Active Drop Pool Cases:** These are currently dropping to gamers actively playing the game on official servers. They are the most plentiful and least expensive cases on the marketplace.
2. **Rare (Discontinued) Drop Pool Cases:** Older cases that no longer drop routinely after matches. Rather, they drop at an incredibly low rate to a portion of players each week. As supply diminishes and need stays, costs for these cases typically rise considerably.
3. **Significant Tournament Souvenir Packages:** Distributed to audiences during official Valve-sponsored esports tournaments (Majors). These plans do not need an essential to open and feature gold sticker labels celebrating the specific match they were dropped throughout.

The Economics of the Steam Market and Third-Party Sites

The economy surrounding CS: GO cases and skins imitates a [CSGO case opening stream](#) miniature Wall Street. Prices are entirely driven by supply and demand, influenced by a number of key factors:



- **Pro Player Usage:** If a well-known esports professional uses a specific skin during a telecasted tournament match, the need-- and rate-- for that skin often skyrockets over night.
