- **Threat Level:** Extremely High. A long losing streak can quickly exhaust a gamer's entire stock.

2. The Low Multiplier Strategy (Auto-Cashout)

- **How it works:** Players set an automatic cashout at an extremely low multiplier, usually in between 1.01 x and 1.10 x.
- **Risk Level:** Low per round, however susceptible to sudden 1.00 x crashes ("instantaneous busts") that eliminate collected revenues in a single round.

3. The Reverse Martingale (Paroli)

- **How it works:** Players double their bets after a *win* instead of a loss, riding hot streaks while keeping losses minimal throughout cold streaks.
- **Threat Level:** Moderate. Requires discipline to leave after a couple of consecutive wins.
