

Hollyville does not announce itself the way a beach town does. There is no boardwalk glow, no line of souvenir shops, no traffic crawling toward the ocean with surfboards strapped to car roofs. That is part of its appeal. Hollyville, in Sussex County, sits in the quieter orbit of Delaware's southern landscape, where the roads narrow, the lots open up, and the rhythm of the place shifts from seasonal tourism to everyday living.

Travelers who make time for Hollyville usually discover it by accident first. They are headed toward Millsboro, or the beaches, or a family property tucked off a state road, and then they realize they have crossed into a place that feels more local than destination. That quality matters.
