(Note: Within each tier, there is an additional possibility that the product will drop in "StatTrak" condition, an unique feature that tracks the variety of kills made with that particular weapon.)

As the table plainly demonstrates, the chances of pulling a high-tier product (Red or Gold) are extremely low. Statistically, the large bulk of case openings will result in a Blue-tier item worth substantially less than the £ 2.50 expense of the secret.
