percentages above represent the "base" possibility per opening. The real "Blue Gems" (Gold tier) are exceptionally rare, frequently estimated at less than 0.0001% for particular high-tier knives.

How the Opening Mechanic Works

When a player clicks "Unlock," the video game produces a random number. This number associates to a particular item within the case's swimming pool.

Float Value & StatTrak

An essential consideration identifying a skin's value is its **Float Value**. This is a number in between 0 and 1 that represents the wear and tear of the weapon:

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00 - 0.07
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07 - 0.15
- **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15 - 0.38
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38 - 0.45
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45 - 1.00

Additionally, some skins feature a **StatTrak™** counter, tracking the number of kills made with that weapon. StatTrak variations are typically more costly than their basic counterparts.

One of the most Popular and Valuable Cases

Not all cases are created equal. Older cases, or those consisting of famous skins like the "Fade" or "Case Hardened" Blue Gems, command astronomical rates on the Steam Community Market.

Top 5 Most Expensive Cases

1. **The CS: GO Weapon Case # 1:** The initial case. Rates change greatly but are typically really high due to nostalgia.
2. **The eSports 2013 Case:** Contains the renowned Howl.
3. **The Revolver Case:** Contains the R8 Revolver|Fade.
4. **The Operation Wildfire Case:** Introduced the Fire Serpent collection.
5. **The Clutch Case:** Known for valuable Gamma Doppler knives.

Many players will get "junk" (Consumer or Mil-Spec skins) worth pennies. Nevertheless, the thrill of the "roll" and the possibility of landing a Covert or Gold product keeps the economy alive. For financial investment functions, buying the case directly is typically safer than spending for the key to open it.

Supply and need. Older cases are no longer dropped by the video game, making them scarce. If they consist of a desirable skin (like the R8 Fade), the rate stays high due to rarity.
