The Economics of CS2 Skins

- **Cease-and-Desist Letters:** In 2016, Valve sent official notices to lots of popular gambling sites demanding they shut down their bot networks.
- **API Restrictions:** Valve introduced trade holds and restricted the functionality of automated trade bots to make skin transfers more cumbersome.
- **Mass Ban Waves:** Periodically, Valve bans hundreds of accounts related to prominent gambling bots, resulting in countless dollars worth of digital possessions being completely locked out of blood circulation.

Regardless of these efforts, designers of gambling sites continuously adjust by shifting domain names, introducing cryptocurrency options, and making use of decentralized peer-to-peer trading systems to bypass Valve's limitations.
