How Does a Case Battle Work? Step-by-Step

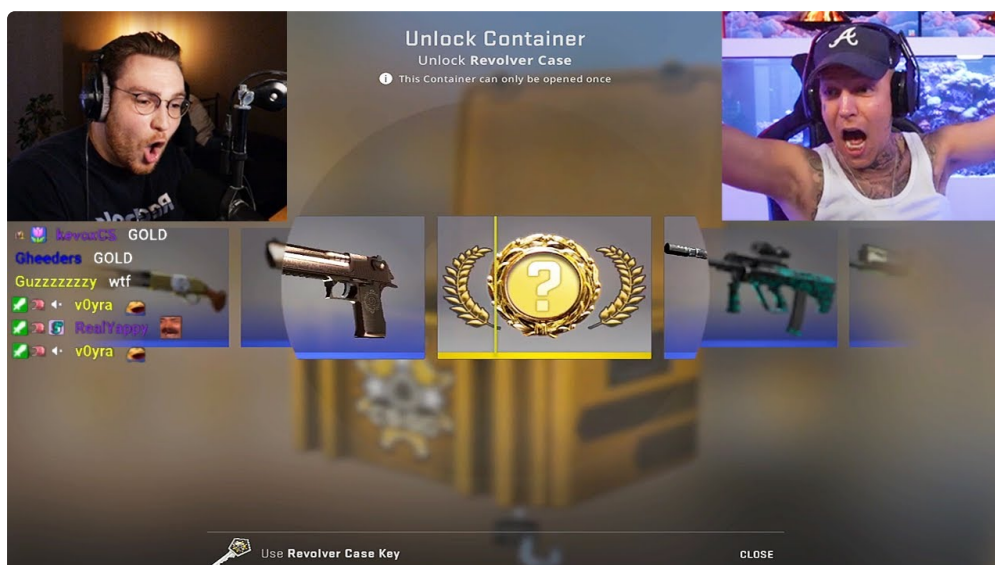
Types of Case Battle Game Modes
