StatTrak™ and Souvenirs

- **StatTrak™:** Items with this innovation feature an orange LED counter that tracks the number of confirmed eliminates made with that particular weapon.
- **Keepsake Packages:** These are dropped during official Valve-sponsored esports tournaments (Majors) and feature gold sticker labels representing the groups and MVP of the round.

The Rarity Tiers

Valve organizes CS2 skins into standardized rarity tiers, which determine how often they drop in-game or emerge from weapon cases.

1. **Consumer Grade (White):** Common, basic drops.
