Early planning also gives you time to compare different transportation methods, review company policies, prepare the automobile, and address questions before the carrier arrives.

Determine Your Pickup and Delivery Locations

The exact pickup and delivery locations are important when planning a car shipment. Large vehicle carriers need enough space to maneuver safely, and some residential streets may not be suitable for large transport trucks.

When requesting a quote, provide complete location information. If the carrier cannot safely access a specific street, the transportation company may arrange a nearby meeting location where the vehicle can be loaded or unloaded safely.

Discuss access limitations with your shipping provider in advance rather than waiting until pickup day. This can help prevent unnecessary delays and confusion.

Choose Between Open and Enclosed Transportation

One of the first decisions customers typically make is whether to use open or enclosed transportation. Both options have advantages, and the right choice depends on the type of vehicle and your priorities.

Open Car Transport

Open transport is widely used for standard vehicle shipments. Multiple automobiles are loaded onto an open carrier, allowing transportation companies to move several vehicles along the same route.

Enclosed transportation may cost more than open shipping because of the specialized equipment and limited carrier capacity. However, owners of specialty vehicles may consider the additional protection worthwhile.

Understand Door-to-Door Vehicle Shipping

Door-to-door transportation is designed to provide convenient pickup and delivery. Instead of requiring customers to take their cars to a distant terminal, the carrier attempts to collect and deliver the vehicle near the requested addresses when road conditions and local restrictions allow.

It is important to understand that door-to-door does not always mean the carrier can physically stop directly in front of a home or business. Large carriers may have difficulty navigating narrow streets, low-clearance roads, crowded areas, or locations with parking restrictions.

If direct access is not practical, the driver may arrange a safe and accessible nearby location.

Consider Terminal-Based Transportation

Some transportation providers may offer terminal-to-terminal arrangements. With this option, the vehicle is delivered to or collected from designated facilities.

Availability varies by provider and location, so ask about the specific options available for your route. Compare the convenience, cost, and accessibility of each arrangement before choosing one.

Be cautious if representatives pressure you to book immediately, avoid answering questions, or provide information that changes from one conversation to another.

Ask About Pickup and Delivery Timeframes

Vehicle shipping is affected by road conditions, weather, traffic, carrier schedules, and other logistical factors. For that reason, transportation companies often provide pickup and delivery windows rather than guaranteed exact arrival times.

Ask the shipper about:

- Expected pickup date
- Estimated transit time

Realistic expectations can help prevent frustration during the transportation process.

Prepare Your Vehicle Before Pickup

Remove Personal Belongings

Remove personal belongings from the passenger compartment, trunk, and other storage areas unless the carrier specifically permits certain items under its policies.

Document Your Vehicle's Condition
