Condition Name	Float Value Range	Visual Description
Factory New (FN)	0.00-- 0.07	Pristine condition with little to no noticeable scratches or use. Normally commands the greatest rate.
Minimal Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Small acnes, slight scratches, or small paint chipping, frequently just visible upon close inspection.
Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Visible wear and tear, scratches on the body, and fading colors. This is the most typical condition.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.44	Significant wear, heavy scratches, and significant paint loss around the edges and high-friction areas.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.44-- 1.00	Incredibly worn, heavily faded, and in some cases dramatically modified look. Some collectors specifically look for extreme BS drifts for a "blackimov" effect.

Beyond standard wear, some skins likewise include a **StatTrak™** innovation module, which tracks the number of kills a gamer gets with that particular weapon, including a glowing orange digital counter to the body of the gun.

The CS2 Skin Economy: How Value is Determined

Unlike cosmetic products in numerous other modern-day computer game, CS2 skins have real-world financial worth because they are completely tradeable and valuable. Players can buy, sell, and trade items by means of the Steam Community Market or through credible third-party markets utilizing real currency or cryptocurrencies.

Several elements dictate the rate of a CS2 skin:

1. **Rarity:** Classified by color tiers-- Consumer (white), Industrial (light blue), Mil-Spec (dark blue), Restricted (purple), Classified (pink), Covert (red), and Extra-Ordinary (gold/yellow for knives and gloves).
2. **Demand and Popularity:** Guns that players use in almost every competitive match (like the AK-47, M4A1-S, and AWP) naturally command higher prices than niche weapons like the Negev or Bizon.

4. **Keepsake Packages:** Items dropped during main Valve-sponsored significant tournaments feature gold stickers commemorating the teams and map, increasing their collectibility.
