percentages above represent the "base" possibility per opening. The actual "Blue Gems" (Gold tier) are exceptionally rare, frequently approximated at less than 0.0001% for specific high-tier knives.

How the Opening Mechanic Works

When a player clicks "Unlock," the game produces a random number. This number associates to a specific item within the case's pool.

Drift Value & StatTrak

An important consider identifying a skin's value is its **Float Value**. This is a number in between 0 and 1 that represents the wear and tear of the weapon:

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00 - 0.07
- **Very Little Wear (MW):** 0.07 - 0.15
- **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15 - 0.38
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38 - 0.45

- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45 - 1.00

Furthermore, some skins feature a **StatTrak™** counter, tracking the number of kills made with that weapon. StatTrak versions are typically more costly than their standard counterparts.

The Most Popular and Valuable Cases

Not all cases are created equal. Older cases, or those including famous skins like the "Fade" or "Case Hardened" Blue Gems, command huge costs on the Steam Community Market.

1. **The CS: GO Weapon Case # 1:** The initial case. Prices fluctuate heavily however are normally very high due to fond memories.
2. **The eSports 2013 Case:** Contains the iconic Howl.
3. **The Revolver Case:** Contains the R8 Revolver|Fade.
4. **The Operation Wildfire Case:** Introduced the Fire Serpent collection.
5. **The Clutch Case:** Known for valuable Gamma Doppler knives.

- **Typical Cost to Open:** £ 3.00 (Key) + £ 0.50 (Case) = **£ 3.50**
- **Typical Return:** Typically hovers around £ 0.80 to £ 1.50, indicating your house (Valve) and the market normally revenue.

The majority of gamers will receive "junk" (Consumer or Mil-Spec skins) worth cents. Nevertheless, the adventure of the "roll" and the possibility of landing a Covert or Gold product keeps the economy alive. For investment functions, buying the case straight is often safer than paying for the key to open it.

Supply and need. Older cases are no longer dropped by the video game, making them scarce. If they contain a desirable skin (like the R8 Fade), the price stays high due to rarity.
