

Why Nepean's festival season needs pest awareness

Nepean stands out as one of Ottawa's busiest local hubs for summer festivals, neighbourhood markets, heritage celebrations, and outdoor seasonal gatherings. Because Nepean is part of the City of Ottawa, local organizers and property owners share broad municipal expectations around waste handling, public health, and property maintenance. Outdoor event sanitation should also include:

- Routine cleaning of spills and sticky residue
- Separate waste stations for food scraps and recyclables
- Protected storage for vendor supplies
- Clear separation between customer areas and waste handling zones
- Regular checks for standing water near handwashing stations

When planning large **community festivals** in Ottawa, organizers should assume that pests will be drawn to any inconsistency in cleanup. Prompt, consistent food waste management reduces risk for guests and keeps vendors operating smoothly.

What Nepean organizers should take action before a festival

Prior to a festival opens in Nepean, the best pest strategy is a organized site review. Vendor setup also matters. Organizers should require vendors to keep food covered, dispose of scraps quickly, and avoid storing attractants in open containers. Communicating expectations ahead of time helps streamline planning on event day and reduces conflict. If the festival includes long operating hours, vendors should be given adequate waste capacity for peak service periods.

A good pre-event checklist for Nepean should include:

- Property inspection of storage, bins, fencing, and utility access
- Assessment of vendor layout and waste station placement
- Review of sanitation practices for food prep and seating areas
- Preparation for end-of-day cleanup and overnight trash removal
