The Step-by-Step DIY Window and Door Tune-Up

1. Examine and Replace Weatherstripping

2. Lubricate Moving Parts

Squeaky hinges and persistent sliding tracks just need a little lubrication.

- **How to repair:** Avoid sticky oils like WD-40 on tracks, as they bring in dust and dirt. Rather, use a silicone-based spray or graphite powder on tracks, hinges, and lock systems to ensure smooth operation.

3. Caulk Gaps Around Frames

Exterior gaps let water seep into walls, causing structural damage.

- **How to repair:** Scrape away old, broken outside caulk. Use a bead of high-grade, paintable outside silicone-acrylic latex caulk along the frame joints, smoothing it out with a damp finger or caulking tool.

4. Change Door Hinges

Drooping doors usually have loose screws or a hinge that requires tension modification.

- **How to repair:** Tighten loose screws. If the holes are stripped, eliminate the screw, insert a small piece of wood toothpick coated in wood glue into the hole, and re-insert the screw for a tight grip.
