Step-by-Step Guides for Common Window Fixes

Depending upon the particular concern, the repair procedure will differ. Below are detailed guidelines for dealing with the 3 most frequent window maintenance tasks.

1. How to Fix a Drafty Window

Drafts not only make a space unpleasant, but they also increase cooling and heating expenses. Repairing them is often a quick DIY weekend job.

- **Locate the Draft:** On a windy day, slowly move a lit incense stick or a wet hand around the window frame. Where the smoke flickers or the skin feels cold, air is dripping.
- **Check and Replace Caulk:**
 1. Scrape away old, split exterior and interior caulk using a putty knife.
 2. Tidy the area completely with rubbing alcohol and let it dry.
 3. Use a bead of exterior-grade silicone or acrylic latex caulk along the joints where the window frame satisfies the siding.
- **Update Weatherstripping:**

1. Open the window and check the foam, felt, or vinyl strips along the sash edges.
2. Peel off worn-out weatherstripping.
3. Cut brand-new self-adhesive V-strip or foam weatherstripping to size and press firmly into place.

2. How to Fix a Stuck Window

Wood windows are particularly vulnerable to swelling throughout damp months or getting glued shut by several layers of paint.

- **Break the Paint Seal:** Run an energy knife thoroughly around the perimeter where the window sash satisfies the frame. Beware not to gouge the wood.
- **Lube the Tracks:** For vinyl or aluminum windows, spray a silicone-based lube into the tracks. Avoid utilizing petroleum-based items like WD-40, as they draw in dirt and gunk.
- **Tap Gently:** Take a wood block and place it against the stubborn sash. Tap the block carefully with a hammer to break any remaining friction without shattering the glass.
- **Sand or Plane:** If the wood is swollen, the window might require to be removed, and the edges lightly sanded or planed down so it can slide freely.

3. How to Replace a Cracked Glass Pane (Single-Pane Window)

While double-pane window repair typically requires replacing the whole insulated system, single-pane glass can be easily repaired at home.



- **Security First:** Wear thick leather gloves and safety glasses. Tape an "X" across the broken glass with duct tape to hold the shards together.
- **Eliminate Broken Glass:** Carefully pull out the staying pieces of glass. Usage pliers to remove the old metal glazes (points) that held the glass in place.
- **Clean the Rabbet:** Scrape away the old, hardened putty (glazing substance) from the wooden recess (rabbet) using a sculpt or putty knife. Use a coat of linseed oil if the wood is dry.
- **Apply New Glazing Compound:** Roll a percentage of new glazing putty into a rope shape and press it into the bottom of the rabbet.
- **Install the New Glass:** Press the brand-new glass pane carefully into the putty bed. Place brand-new glazing points every 6 to 8 inches to secure the glass.
- **Finish the Glazing:** Apply a triangular wedge of putty around the outside edges, smoothing it down with a putty knife. Paint the substance once it cures (typically in 7 to 14 days).

2. **Examine Seals Annually:** Inspect the caulking and weatherstripping before severe summertime and winter temperature levels set in. Retouch any fractures instantly.
3. **Examine Hardware:** Tighten loose screws on hinges, latches, and cranks. Oil moving metal parts with a dry silicone spray when a year.
4. **Control Indoor Humidity:** High indoor humidity can trigger condensation, causing mold growth and decaying wood window frames. Use dehumidifiers in damp basements and exhaust fans in bathroom and kitchens.
