4. **The Steam Community Market:** Once acquired, items enter a 7-day trade cooldown, after which gamers can purchase, sell, or trade them easily on the Steam Community Market.

The Economics of Rust Skins

- **Snow Biome Domination:** The *Whiteout* and *Arctic* skin sets make gamers nearly undetectable against snow-covered ground, resulting in intense need whenever winter wipes occur.
