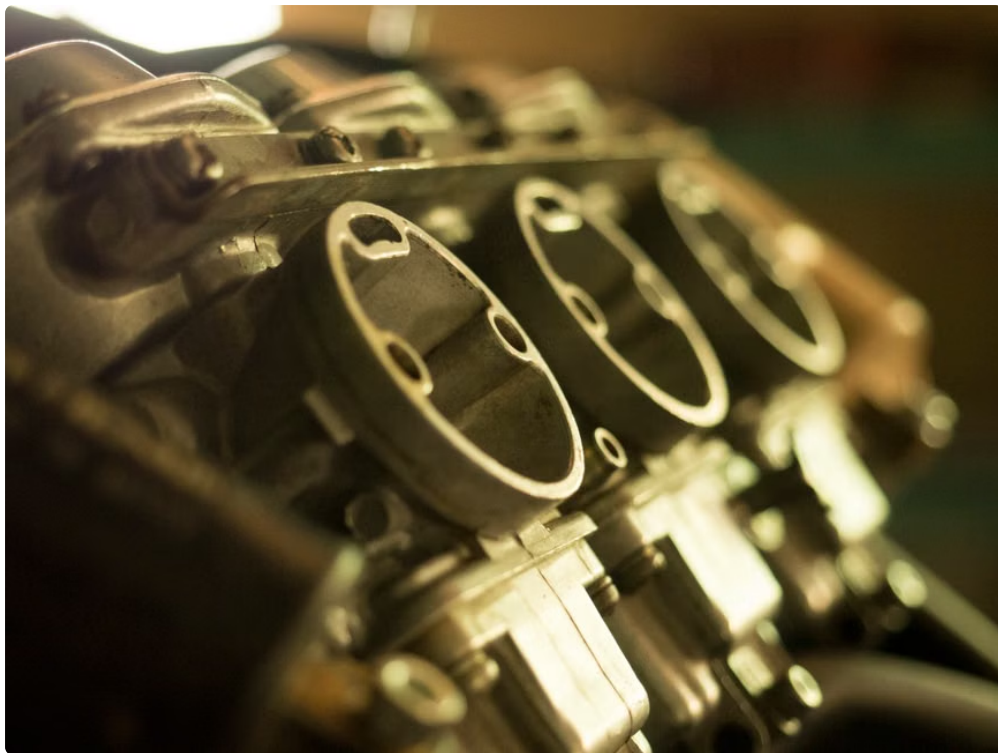
Notice how this format clearly states what happens at each stage and what specific symbols or events activate that stage. This is the kind of information you want to prioritize over visuals.

- How those features activate (e.g., “wilds appear randomly on reels 2 and 4”)
- Any limitations or caps (e.g., “maximum multiplier of 5x during free spins”)

Why Feature Trigger Conditions and Limitations Matter

3. **Find the mechanics explanation.** Separate theme from gameplay.

4. **Identify the round flow.** Notice base games vs. bonus rounds and their triggers.
5. **Read feature triggers carefully.** Note which symbols and conditions activate bonuses.
