Beyond these basic tiers, weapon surfaces also include **StatTrak**™ technology (which tracks the variety of eliminates made with that particular weapon, marked by a digital counter on the weapon) and **Souvenir** variations (dropped <https://cs2skin.com/> during official esports tournaments).

Wear Conditions and Float Values

A major element in a skin's appearance and rate is its **Wear Condition**, typically referred to as the float worth. The float worth is a decimal number ranging from **0.00 to 1.00** that determines how scratched, used, or faded a texture appears.

The 5 official wear conditions are:



1. **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07-- Looks pristine, though some skins can still have small scratches even at 0.00.
2. **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15-- Slight signs of wear, usually small scratches on the publication or edges.
3. **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15-- 0.38-- Noticeable wear and tear, however the overall artwork remains intact. This is the most common condition traded.
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45-- Significant wear, with big portions of the paint scraped away or faded.
5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00-- Heavily harmed. Some skins undergo massive visual transformations at this phase, sometimes looking completely rusted or weathered.

Keep in mind: Certain skins are "float-capped," suggesting they can not exist in particular conditions. For example, a particular skin might be capped at a minimum float of 0.06, making Factory New the only high-tier condition readily available.

The Economics of CS: GO Skins

The marketplace surrounding these virtual products is frequently studied by financial experts and financial experts. Since Valve allows peer-to-peer trading and third-party cash-out sites, skins operate similarly to stocks or unusual art. Several crucial drivers dictate skin prices:

- **Pro Player Influence:** When a well-known esports professional uses a specific skin during a significant competition, its popularity and cost frequently surge overnight.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can trade in ten skins of one rarity tier for one skin of the next greater tier from the very same collection, impacting the blood circulation of high-end items.
- **Sticker labels and Patches:** Applying uncommon competition stickers (such as Kato '14 holos) to a weapon can significantly increase its overall worth, depending upon the purchaser.
