

A garage door that refuses to close is often experiencing a sensor problem rather than a significant mechanical failure. If a person, bicycle, storage box, or vehicle crosses the beam, the opener should stop the door or activate its **automatic reversal system**. Depending on the opener model, the door may reverse immediately or refuse to close from the remote and wall control.

The sensors must face each other at the correct height and angle. Even a small shift in a bracket can interrupt the beam. A blinking sensor light, a dark indicator, or lights showing different colors may point to an alignment, power, or wiring issue. Because the sensors are part of the garage door safety system, they should not be bypassed.



Warning Signs You Need Garage Door Sensor Repair

The usual symptom is that the **garage door will not close**, or it closes only when you keep pressing the wall button without releasing it. This behavior suggests that the opener may be recognizing a safety fault. Other symptoms include:

- **Flashing sensor lights** or a single *flickering sensor light* on one side.
- Visible **misaligned sensors** that do not face each other directly.
- A garage door that starts down and reverses right away.
- A garage door remote that raises the door but fails to shut it.
- Sensor brackets that vibrate, bend, or move when the track is handled.
- Intermittent operation after strong winds, cleaning, impact, or a power interruption.

Before assuming the sensors are defective, check for boxes, tools, leaves, or other objects near the beam. A dusty lens can cause the same symptoms as a failed sensor. Frequent Sources of Sensor Problems in Los Angeles
