Cockroaches are another winter pest that can survive inside heated buildings year-round. They are attracted to moisture, crumbs, grease, and clutter. Kitchens, laundry areas, and basements with damp conditions are common trouble spots. Because they hide well, a few sightings may indicate a larger infestation.

Spiders are often drawn indoors because there are insects to feed on, and they can hide in quiet places like storage rooms, crawlspaces, and corners near ceiling junctions. While many spiders are not dangerous, they can signal broader pest activity in the home.

Silverfish also become more noticeable during winter in humid areas, especially where paper, cardboard, or stored textiles are kept. They are often linked to moisture and can thrive in neglected storage spaces.

How do pests enter during cold weather?

Most winter invaders do not need a large opening. They use small, overlooked access routes and follow warm air, food odours, or hidden travel paths.
