How Third-Party Platforms Operate

Because Valve limits direct monetary deals for skin cash-outs within its own API, third-party gambling websites rely on creative workarounds.

Normally, users log into a gambling site using their Steam credentials. To transfer funds, players transfer CS2 skins from their Steam inventory to a bot controlled by the gambling platform. The site then credits the user's account with internal currency or site coins. When players desire to squander, they use those coins to purchase other skins from the site's bot stock, which are then traded back to the player's Steam account.
