Third, operations struggle. Crowds bunch near too few units, circulation slows, and security staff are pulled into managing aggravation instead of focusing on greater risks.

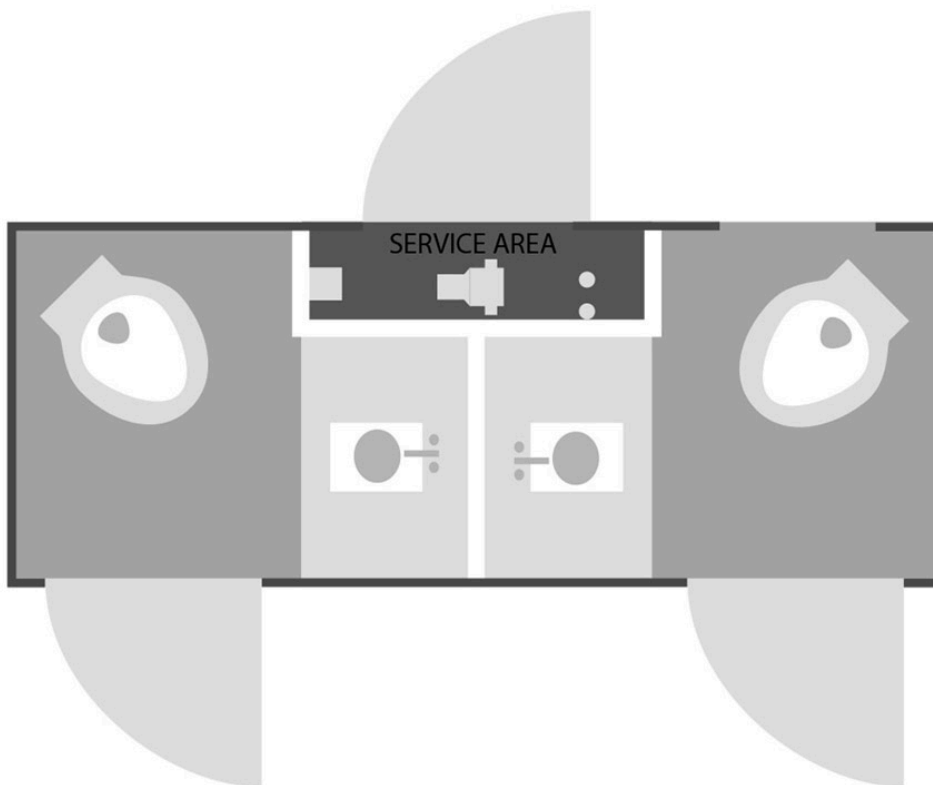
Balancing individual restroom quality with quantity
