0.15-- 0.38 Noticeable wear, scratches on paint and metal parts. **Well-Worn (WW)** 0.38-- 0.45 Considerable

wear, paint greatly faded or chipped. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.45-- 1.00 Badly damaged, often completely changing the look of the weapon.

*Keep in mind: Some skins are "capped," implying they can **cs2skin** not drop in Factory New condition, making lower-float variations exceedingly unusual and expensive.*

Rarity Tiers and Finishes

Skins are categorized into different rarity tiers, which dictate their drop rates in cases and total prestige.

- **Consumer Grade (White):** Common, standard drops.
- **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly less typical low-tier items.
- **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** Standard weapon surfaces found in a lot of cases.
- **Limited (Purple):** Higher-tier weapons, typically utilized in trade-ups.
- **Classified (Pink):** Rare, highly comprehensive designs.
- **Covert (Red):** The most prestigious standard weapon surfaces in the video game.
