Tactical Advantages: Form vs. Function

1. Camouflage Sets

In a video game greatly focused on stealth, placing, and forest hiding, skin option matters.

- **Woodland/Forest Camo:** Sets like the *Sylvan* or *Forest Raiders* series assistance players mix into timberline and bushes.
- **Snow Camo:** Essential for tundra biomes. Wearing intense red in the snow makes a player a walking bullseye, whereas white-themed skins offer important concealment.

2. Night Advantages

Nighttime in *Rust* can be pitch black. Clever players utilize particular categories of skins to keep an edge when the sun decreases:
