Coinflip	A straightforward 1v1 video game where two gamers wager comparable skin values. One is appointed heads, the other tails, and a digital coin figures out the winner.	Low (Platform takes a little commission, around 3%-- 5%)

How CS2 Skin Deposits and Withdrawals Work
