What Is an Electric Bicycle Under California Law?

Under california law, an electric bicycle is defined in the California Vehicle Code (CVC). The cvc and the code describe a bicycle with fully operable pedals and an electric motor of less than 750 watts. In 2015, the ca legislature approved SB 1271, sometimes written as sb 1271, to create three classes of electric bikes.

Class 1 ebikes are pedal-assist only and stop at 20 mph. Class 2 ebikes also have a motor that can move the bike without pedaling, but they are limited to 20 mph. Class 3 ebikes have pedal assist and may reach 28 mph. The class of your e-bike determines where you can ride on roads and paths. It also affects a personal injury case when a violation of the code is used as evidence of negligence.

How Is Liability Determined in a Los Angeles Bike Accident?

Liability in a bike accident is based on negligence. The party whose unreasonable conduct caused the crash is at fault. Under California's comparative fault rules, you may recover damages even if you are partially at fault, but your recovery decreases by your share of blame.

In Los Angeles, at fault parties may include a motor vehicle driver, another rider, a pedestrian, a rental platform, or a government agency responsible for county roads. An attorney can identify each liable party and gather insurance coverage. You should not talk to an insurance adjuster before your case is reviewed.

How Do E-Bike Accidents Differ From Traditional Bicycle Accidents?

Traditional bicycles require physical power, while electric bikes add speed and battery technology. The higher speed of an ebike increases the force of impact, the length of skid marks, and the risk of head trauma. A bicycle accident involving an electric bicycle may also involve product liability if the motor surges, the battery catches fire, or the frame fails.

Many electric bikes are treated as bicycles, not motor vehicles, but local rules and rental agreements can create different duties. One important difference is that rental platforms often carry insurance for riders, while a privately

A city or county may be liable if a road defect caused the crash. Identifying fault parties early is critical because each party may have a separate insurance policy and a different level of exposure.

How Can a Rental Platform Like Lime or Bird Be Liable for Your Injuries?

Shared electric bicycles are common in Los Angeles, but they create complex liability questions. If you rent an ebike through an app, the rental platform may be liable for negligent maintenance, failure to warn about defects, or placing unsafe bikes into service. A cracked frame, worn brake, or defective battery can cause a severe accident.

The terms of use may say that you assume risk, but those terms can be challenged when the platform knew about a problem. The at fault parties in a shared-ebike accident may include the platform, the previous rider who damaged the bike, and the company that serviced it. What Is the Role of SB 1271 and the California Vehicle Code in Ebike Cases?

SB 1271 changed the legal landscape for electric bikes in California. The ca legislature enacted sb 1271 to place ebikes within the existing bicycle framework. The cvc now defines electric bicycles. These include class 1, class 2, and class 3 categories, as well as operating rules for each category.

There are important exceptions. If the accident was caused by a dangerous condition on government property, you may need to file a government claim within six months.
