What NOT to Put in a 19-Litre Tank

To ensure animal welfare, prevent keeping the following types in a 5-gallon aquarium:

- **Goldfish:** Goldfish produce enormous amounts of waste and grow far too big. They need a minimum of 75+ litres for a single elegant goldfish.
- **Tetras, Danios, or Barbs:** These are schooling fish. To be delighted, they need to be kept in groups of six or more and need horizontal swimming area (at least a 38-litre/ 10-gallon tank).
- **Plecostomus (Plecos):** Even the smaller species (like the Bristlenose Pleco) grow out of a 19-litre tank quickly.

4. Important Equipment for a 19-Litre Tank

Setting up an 18.9-litre aquarium requires specific gear reduced to nano proportions.

- **Filtering:** You will need a small, adjustable hang-on-back (HOB) filter or a sponge filter rated for approximately 20 or 30 litres. Ensure the circulation rate isn't too strong, as fish like Bettas resist heavy currents.
