Usually, users log into a gambling site using their Steam qualifications. To deposit funds, gamers transfer CS2 skins from their Steam stock to a bot managed by the gambling platform. The site then credits the user's account with internal currency or site coins. When players wish to cash out, they utilize those coins to purchase other skins from the site's bot inventory, which are then traded back to the gamer's Steam account.

# Recognizing the Risks: Why Caution is Essential
