How the CS2 Gambling Ecosystem Functions

To get involved in CS2 gambling, users typically do not deposit traditional fiat currency (like GBP or EUR) directly. Instead, the ecosystem depends on a specific series of deals:



1. **Purchasing Skins:** Players purchase skins either by means of the Steam Market, third-party marketplaces, or directly from other gamers.
2. **Transferring to the Site:** Players log into a gambling site utilizing their Steam qualifications and trade their skins to a bot account controlled by the platform. The site credits the user's account with on-site balance equal to the market value of the skins.
