1. Opening a casino like MrQ on a mobile browser takes about 2 taps: one to unlock the phone, another to tap the shortcut or type the URL.
2. Signing up generally involves around 6 to 8 taps on mobile to fill in information via on-screen keyboards and confirm via buttons sized for thumbs.
3. Finding games is mostly done within 1 to 2 taps from the homepage, thanks to curated categories and search features.

Compared to desktop sites where clicking and filling forms might be faster for typing but slower to reach games due to denser menus, mobile casino UX shines in focusing on key user actions and minimizing friction.

Catalogue Size vs Findability: Which Matters More?

Online casinos often boast huge game catalogues, but a large selection can be double-edged on mobile devices where screen real estate is limited. The key challenge is balancing **catalogue size** with **findability**.

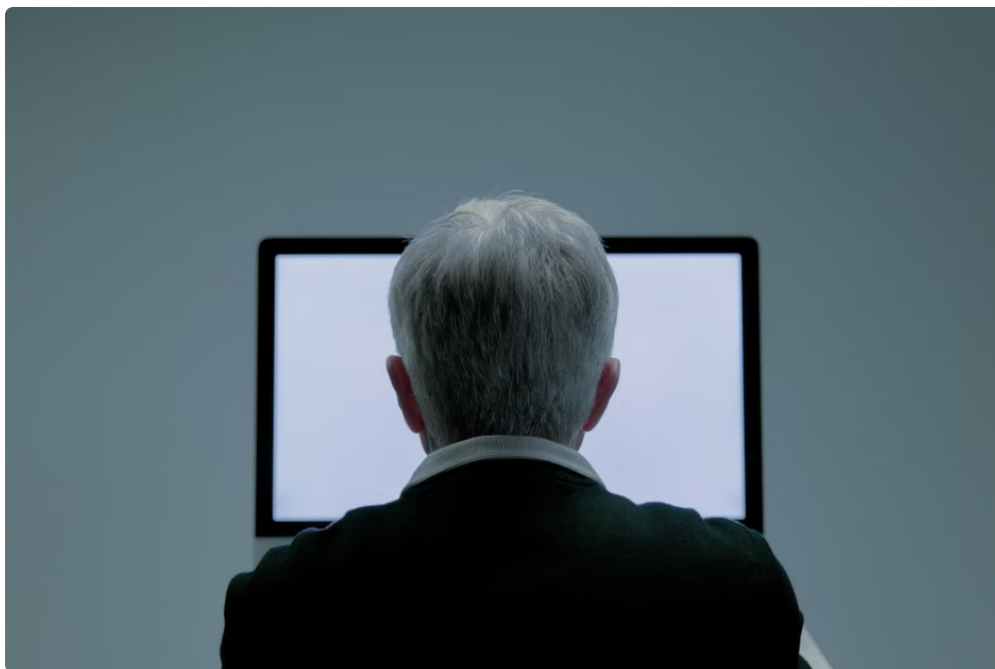
- **Desktop casino sites** can display hundreds of options with filters and side menus, but overwhelm and decision fatigue set in.
