The Five Wear Categories

When a weapon finish is dropped or unboxed, it is appointed a specific **Float Value** ranging from 0.00 to 1.00. This float identifies how scratched, used, or faded the texture appears in-game.

Wear Category Float Value Range In-Game Appearance **Factory New (FN)** 0.00-- 0.07 Pristine, very little to no scratches or acnes. **Very Little Wear (MW)** 0.07-- 0.15 Really small wear, generally noticeable on close examination. **Field-Tested (FEET)** 0.15-- 0.38 Visible scratches and endure popular edges. **Well-Worn (WW)** 0.38-- 0.45 Significant wear, paint fading, and prominent scratches. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.45-- 1.00 Heavily distressed, rusted, or severely faded textures.

(Note: Certain products in fact look better or end up being more desirable in greater wear conditions-- such as the "AWP|Asiimov"-- while others demand a pristine Factory New condition to command high costs.)

Rarity Tiers

Weapon finishes are further classified by color-coded rarity tiers, which dictate how regularly they appear in cases and trade-ups:

- **Consumer Grade/ Industrial Grade (White/Light Blue):** Common, low-tier items often utilized for standard trade-ups.
- **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** Standard drop-tier items.
- **Limited (Purple):** Uncommon, preferable mid-tier finishes.
- **Classified (Pink):** Rare and striking designs frequently main to collections.
- **Covert (Red):** The greatest basic weapon tier, featuring iconic designs like the Redline or Fire Serpent.
- **Unique/ Extraordinarily Rare (Gold):** Knives and Gloves. These are the crown gems of the marketplace.

The Economy: Trading, Markets, and Value

The digital economy surrounding these items is totally player-driven. Valve sets the baseline through official in-game case drops and the Steam Community Market, but an enormous external ecosystem exists through third-party trading sites, peer-to-peer markets, and community forums.

Factors That Influence Price

1. **Supply and Demand:** Items from older, ceased cases are rarer, driving up their market value.
2. **Drift and Pattern Templates:** Some products feature particular pattern indexes that alter the visual look completely (e.g., the "Case Hardened" pattern, where blue quantities dictate extreme worth).
3. **Stickers and StatTrak:** Applying unusual, discontinued tournament sticker labels can increase an item's value. StatTrak technology, which tracks the variety of eliminates a gamer gets with a particular weapon, likewise commands a price premium.
4. **Pro-Player Association:** When a professional esports gamer utilizes a particular weapon surface during a major competition, need for that item frequently increases overnight.
