4. Valve's Crackdowns

Valve, the designer of Counter-Strike, has repeatedly tried to suppress skin gambling. The business has provided extensive cease-and-desist letters to prominent gambling operators, revoked API keys used by automated betting bots, and executed trade cooldowns (e.g., forcing traded products to remain in a stock for 7 days) to interrupt the fluid motion of <https://skinlords.com/> gambling properties.
