

Fort Salonga sits in that part of Long Island that still rewards slowing down. It is close enough to major corridors that you never feel isolated, yet removed enough to keep a quieter, more deliberate pace. The area has a reputation for leafy roads, substantial homes, and views that remind you the North Shore has always attracted people who wanted both proximity to the city and a sense of retreat.
