- **Prevent Chasing Losses:**

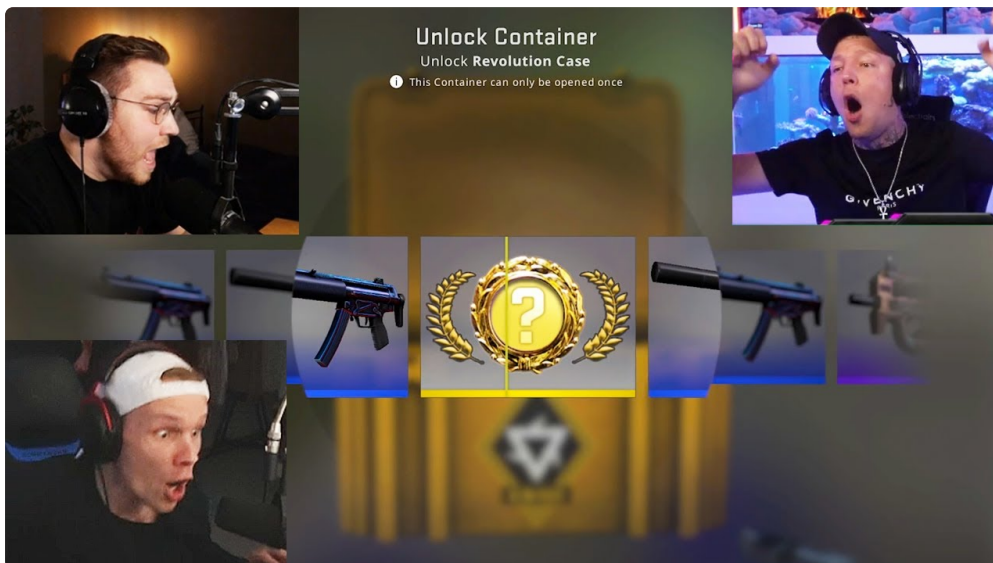
- If you experience a losing streak, step away. Trying to immediately win back lost funds typically causes spontaneous decisions and diminished balances.
