- The site generates a secret server seed before the video game starts and supplies the gamer with a hashed version of it.
- The gamer's web browser generates a customer seed.
- Once the round concludes, the server seed is exposed, enabling the player to input both seeds into a verification tool to show the result was predetermined and unmanipulated.

However, players should note that while *fairness* guarantees the site isn't actively cheating on a per-bet basis, it does not mean the chances remain in the player's favor. Your home edge stays strongly in location.

Threats Associated with CS2 Gambling
