Case Opening	Replicates the in-game case opening experience with custom odds and possibly higher return rates than official Valve cases. Purely luck-based; chances are identified by the platform.	
Coinflip	A 1v1 game where 2 gamers bet skins of equivalent value on a virtual coin toss. Winner takes all (minus a site commission). 50/50 chances, based on a platform rake (cost).	
Prize	Numerous players contribute skins to a common pool. The higher the worth contributed, the greater the opportunity of winning the whole pot. Probability-based based upon relative skin worth.

- **Customer Support:** Reliable 24/7 live chat support is important for resolving deposit failures, trade hold concerns, or account questions promptly.
