

Rockville has a way of revealing itself in layers. On one street, you see courthouse-era gravitas and older brick homes with deep setbacks. A few blocks away, there are modern townhomes, office parks, and the steady movement of commuters heading toward I-270. It is a county seat, a bedroom community, a business district, a transit corridor, and, for many people, the place where daily life happens in practical, unglamorous ways. The city's history is not locked behind glass. It is written into zoning changes, subdivision names, church steeples, local shops, school fields, and even the garage doors that open and close every morning before sunrise.

Springs lose tension over time. Rollers wear flat spots. Tracks collect debris. Sensors drift out of alignment. Even a well-maintained system can struggle after a stretch of heavy rain followed by a cold snap. If a door begins reversing for no clear reason, it may not be a dramatic failure. It may simply be that the photo eyes are dirty or slightly out of line. If the door starts acting heavier than usual, the springs may be nearing the end of their service life.

A pop where there used to be a smooth hum means something has shifted.
